Comment from the Council Table

Recycling Rate Continues to Climb

A small item in the June issue of this Newsletter noted a big achievement: For the third year in a row, the Town had a recycling rate of over 50%. In 2006, the rate was 55.1%. That is well over the state-mandated rate of 25%. Great job, Vienna!

This is good environmental news and also good economic news. Over the past several years, the cost to dispose of "regular trash" at Fairfax County's West Ox Road Transfer Station has risen from \$41.95 per ton in 2003 to \$51.45 in 2007. By comparison, we pay \$15.00 per ton to dispose of "commingled" recycling (that's glass, cans and plastic bottles) from our curbside pickup. Paper recycling costs are variable; depending on the market, we may receive payment from the recycler, or have to pay a modest amount for the processing.

What it comes down to is this: The more we can reduce the amount of household trash we put into the waste stream, the less we have to spend on getting rid of it, and the less we add to bulging landfills. A classic "win-win" situation.

So where do we go from 55.1%? "Up" is a good direction. The percentage can increase as we all do our best to make sure recyclable materials aren't being discarded with regular trash. Around town, that will be helped by the recent addition of recycling containers for bottles and cans at Waters Field and the Town Green, following citizen requests for these. More containers will be placed in other Town parks in the coming months.

At home, taking an extra step or two will make maximizing recycling easier. For paper (which includes newspapers, junk mail, office paper and phone books), try having a recycling bag or box right next to where you open your mail, so that the discards can go straight in there instead of the wastebasket. (Just make sure to remove any plastic from the mail first, please!) For cans, glass and plastic bottles, having a separate bag or bin under the sink makes it handy to put rinsed recyclables there instead of the trash can.

In addition to increasing our recycling, we can go the other direction and

decrease the amount of trash we generate overall. Again, small steps are easy and effective. Here are two ideas: As convenient as those single serving water bottles are, producing and disposing of them chews up a lot of energy. When you are on the go, reusable sport bottles are a great alternative. For bringing home groceries, most of the major chains are offering reusable grocery totes for a modest price. The new designs are easy to load and carry, and you won't end up with dozens of plastic bags that need to be carted back to the store to be recycled or, worse yet, end up in the trash.

No one will be one hundred percent perfect at recycling one hundred percent of the time, and that includes me. (Please remember that when you see me at the grocery store having *yet again* forgotten my grocery totes at home!) But every effort

helps to make a difference. Thanks for getting us to 55.1%, and let's take it from there!

Recycling Fun Facts

from Fairfax County's recycling program for kids

- Americans throw away enough aluminum in three months to rebuild all of our commercial airplanes!
- Every year, Americans throw away enough office and writing paper to build a wall 12 feet high, stretching from Los Angeles to New York City!
- Recycling one ton of paper saves one acre of trees!
- More than 30 million trees are cut down to create one year's worth of newspapers!
- Paper makes up the largest single item in the trash, accounting for 37%!
- If all the glass bottles and jars collected through recycling in the U.S. in one year were laid end to end, they would reach the moon and half way back to the earth!
- Glass can be recycled an infinite number of times!
- The energy saved from recycling one glass bottle will light a 100-watt bulb for four hours!
- Used plastic soda and juice bottles are used to make carpets, insulating materials in clothes and sleeping bags, strapping, scouring pads, auto parts, paint brushes, bottles, and other things such as tennis balls!
- We can recycle plastic milk, water and detergent bottles to make new detergent and engine oil bottles, trash cans, flower pots, recycling bins, drainage pipes, park benches, playground equipment, traffic barrier cones, kitchen drain boards and combs!
- The post-consumer plastics recycling industry provides jobs for more than 52,000 American workers.

Special Pickup Deadline Oct. 1

Monday, October 1, is the last day for Town of Vienna residents to call for a Special Pickup this year. Because of fall leaf collection, no orders for Special Pickups are taken in October, November and December.

To dispose of unwanted furniture, building materials, brush and other debris not included in the regular trash collection, residents can order a Special Pickup. Place discards at the curbside, then call the Special Pickup recording *promptly* at 703-255-5727 and be prepared to leave the following information: your name, address, daytime phone number, amount of debris, and type of debris.

Each residence is allowed two free Special Pickups per year, with a limit of one dump truck load per pickup (about the size of a Volkswagon "beetle"). Additional pickups cost \$75 dollars per load for all items except brush. The fee for additional loads of brush is \$25 each.

Special Pickup Guidelines

The amount and type of debris allowed are limited to the following:

1. Discarded furniture, swing sets and playground equipment.
2. Sod and brush.
3. 300 pounds of scrap metal per residence, small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires. All tires must be removed from the rim.
4. Trees and limbs of a diameter greater than 1½ inches and less than 6 inches, and no more than 8 feet in length.
5. Building materials (not generated by contractor), which include the following items: wood, broken concrete, bricks or block, fences, drywall, and paneling. Each residence is limited to 300 pounds (approximately two wheelbarrow loads) of masonry items such as concrete, brick, block, stone, rock, etc. per pickup.
6. Please refrain from placing piles of brush under power lines or trees, or close to shrubs, walls or vehicles. Place all piles in an open area accessible to a crane truck.
7. All sharp items such as box cutters, razors, saw blades and large panes of glass should be wrapped in several layers of newspaper.
8. In the interest of safety, parents should caution their children not to play in or around debris placed at the curb for a special pickup.

The following items will **not** be picked up:

1. Gas tanks.
2. Fuel oil tanks.
3. Pressurized tanks such as propane, air or freon.
4. Mounted tires. (Town crews will pick up the tire and the rim as long as they are separated.)
5. Tree stumps and tree parts over 6 inches in diameter. Large tree stumps or tree parts over 6 inches can be disposed of at the Fairfax County Transfer Station located on West Ox Road or at the Fairfax County Landfill located in Lorton.
6. Hazardous materials such as fuel, paints, solvents, insecticides, fluorescent light tubes, etc. can be disposed of through the Fairfax County Hazardous Waste Disposal Program. The drop-off center for hazardous waste is the I-66 Citizens' Recycling and Disposal Facility located at 4618 West Ox Rd. (just beyond the Fire & Rescue training academy). Call 703-324-5068 for further information.
7. Biohazardous waste including needles and syringes.
8. Contractor generated material.
9. Brush and trash that are mixed.
10. Dirt.
11. White goods, which include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, window air conditioners, whole house air conditioners, microwave ovens, large toaster ovens, hot water heaters, garbage disposals, washing machines, dryers, cook-tops, dehumidifiers and furnaces.

Call Promptly for Your Special Pickup

Please call the Special Pickup number, 703-255-5727, as soon as debris is placed at the curbside. Piles of trash that go uncollected for weeks on end because of residents' failure to call for a Special Pickup are an eyesore and a potential health and safety hazard.

It is illegal to place debris in the public right-of-way without arranging for a Special Pickup. When an illegal pile of trash is spotted by or reported to Town personnel, the resident will receive a notice to call for a Special Pickup within 48 hours. If no action is taken by the resident after the notice is issued, the Town will seek legal remedy to gain compliance with the Town Code.

No White Goods

White goods are not collected as part of the Special Pickup program. White goods include stoves, dishwashers, refrigerators, window air conditioners, whole house air conditioners, microwave ovens, large toaster ovens, hot water heaters, garbage disposals, washing machines, dryers, cook-tops, dehumidifiers and furnaces.

Many appliance dealers will remove an old unit when a new one is delivered. Also, residents may take white goods to the Fairfax County I-66 Transfer Station, 4618 West Ox Rd., or the I-95 Landfill Complex, 9850 Furnace Rd. in Lorton. There is a \$1 disposal fee for each appliance. The hours of operation are 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Sunday.

No Contractor Debris In Special Pickups

If you employ contractors for home renovations or other services, they must take any waste away with them. The Town's Special Pickup program is meant to aid residents in disposing of bulky materials after performing the work themselves. Contractor-generated waste material will not be picked up.

Halloween Parade Entry Deadline

Friday, September 28, is the entry deadline for the 61st annual Vienna Halloween Parade. This year's parade theme is "Jamestown – Celebrating 400 Years of History." Grand Marshal Woody Bentley, a member of the Rotary Club of Vienna and Chairman of ViVa! Vienna!, is a descendent of American Indian princess Pocahontas, who befriended the Englishmen landing in the New World in 1607.

The parade will step off at 7 p.m. Wednesday, October 24, on Maple Avenue. Participants are encouraged to focus on 400 years of Virginia history. Entry application forms and information can be downloaded from the Town's Web site, www.viennava.gov, or call the Vienna Parks and Recreation Department at 703-255-6360. Because space is limited to the first 90 approved applicants, the parade may fill before the entry deadline. Completed applications do not guarantee entrance.

The categories for judging of parade entrants are Youth Band, Adult Band, Float with Music, Float without Music, Youth Performers, Adult Performers and Antique Vehicles. Floats will continue to be judged on creativity and theme interpretation. This year's awards ceremony will be at the November 5 Town Council meeting.

Police Rely on Alert Citizens To Report Suspicious Activities

On Saturday, July 28, at approximately 2:50 a.m., Master Police Officers Maurice Williams and Art Sylmar were dispatched to the 200 block of Locust Street, S.E., in response to a report of a larceny in progress. Witnesses residing in the neighborhood were enjoying a late night on the patio of their home when they observed two men pushing a cart containing a gas grill. They became suspicious and noted a detailed description of the men. Their suspicions were confirmed when the men returned moments later pushing another grill.

The witnesses notified the police and continued to observe the two men. Realizing they had been seen, the men ran off, but the witnesses were able to provide arriving officers with their description and the location where they were last seen. The officers searched the area and located the two suspects and three stolen grills. Investigation revealed the grills were taken from the rear of Stalcup Hardware at 229 Maple Ave., E. Due largely to the observant actions of the neighbors and a prompt police response, arrests were made.

Crimes large and small are solved or prevented every day in Vienna thanks to alert citizens who are willing to call the police with their concerns. Please never hesitate to report anything that seems suspicious as soon as it occurs. An officer can be on the scene to investigate often within a matter of seconds.

Neighborhood Watch groups have been organized throughout town and have been successful in reducing crime. Signs posted on neighborhood streets and citizen patrols provide highly visible warnings to lawbreakers. In addition, individual citizens in these areas become more aware of and more willing to report suspicious activities. The active involvement of citizens in safeguarding their homes "hardens" an area against crime and causes burglars and other criminals to seek easier targets elsewhere.

Coyotes in Vienna – They're Here!

Many months ago I saw what I thought was a coyote but I couldn't believe my eyes and thought I must have been mistaken. Then this summer I saw another on Park Street near Cedar Lane about 11 at night and was positive. Since then I have talked with several other residents who have spotted them here in town.

The Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries has an excellent article called "Living with the Coyote in Virginia." You can find it at <http://www.dgif.state.va.us/habitat/landowners/infosheets/coyote.pdf>.

The main points listed include encouraging the coyote to avoid humans, keeping small pets inside, and not leaving pet food outside. There is also a good description of the coyote, its distribution, habits and management.

It said there are very few recorded instances of coyotes attacking people, but they are territorial and do not tolerate dogs trespassing on "their" territory. *Washington post.com* reported that coyotes were spotted two years ago in Falls Church and an incident of a coyote attacking a small dog being walked by its owner at the West Falls Church Metro station. It also said the City's animal control office has received reports of coyote sightings almost every day.

They eat almost anything nutritious – vegetables, fruits, insects, and killed or scavenged wildlife, including cats. A coyote will not pass up a free meal and will scavenge exposed garbage or other refuse, so if you feed pets in your yard or on your porch, feed only enough food that can be completely consumed by your pet in a short amount of time, and secure garbage cans and lids in order to prevent coyotes from overturning the can for an easy meal.

Coyotes in the eastern U.S. are larger than those in the west. Females weigh 30-40 lbs. and males can weigh as much as 60 lbs. They have a variety of colors – blond, tan, grayish black, and black with a white blaze in the center of the chest. Keep your eyes open for them, mostly from dusk to dawn, and you may spot one.

Full steam ahead: Update on the Louise Archer Elementary School PTA Safe Routes To School Program

Last year, our Safe Routes To School (SRTS) program was in its infancy. Throughout 2007, the program has matured quite a bit.

This year, we have:

- Been approved for a Safe Routes To School grant from the State of Virginia;
- Made a presentation on Safe Routes To School at the National PTA Convention; and
- Prepared a detailed schedule for our Summer/Fall 2007 Safe Routes To School efforts.



In April of this year, we were approved for an SRTS program grant from the State of Virginia. This grant provides us with the funding necessary to purchase SRTS and general safety education material, to continue our SRTS public awareness campaign, to hold events designed to encourage more walking and bicycling to school, and to cover general administrative expenses and supplies.

In June, I made a presentation on SRTS at the National PTA Convention. As part of a workshop entitled “Promising Practices that Support Health and Wellness in Schools and Communities,” I discussed our SRTS efforts to date.

We created a detailed schedule for our upcoming SRTS program activities. These education and encouragement activities include:

September

- Bicycle and pedestrian safety seminars (after school hours, for parents and the public)
- In-class SRTS and general safety education (for students)

October

- Walk To School Week (WTSW) for students
- Frequent Walker and Bicyclist Challenge

At least two other Vienna area schools have expressed interest in implementing an SRTS program. We hope to coordinate our SRTS activities with those schools, and any other schools that express interest.

We are hard at work preparing for our fall 2007 activities. Safe Routes to School provides a variety of important benefits to kids and their communities, including improved health, reduced traffic congestion, better air quality, and enhanced neighborhood safety. Finally, this movement is part of the solution for the alarming nationwide trend toward child obesity and inactivity.

In 1969, approximately 50% of children walked or biked to school, and 87% of children living within one mile of school did. Today, fewer than 15% of schoolchildren walk or bike to school. As a result, kids today are less active, less independent, and less healthy.

SEPTEMBER 1997 – Citizens with access to the Internet are invited to visit the new Town of Vienna Web site. The site contains online versions of the current newsletter and recreation brochure, calendar of events, Town Council agenda, employment announcements, budget, and much more. Recreation class registration, job application, vehicle registration, and other forms are available for downloading and printing. SEPTEMBER 1987 – At its September 14 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposed ordinance to control dangerous dogs. The ordinance defines a dangerous dog and would make keeping such a dog illegal unless the owner complies with the requirements of a special permit, including confining the dog while on the owner's property, muzzling it when off the property, and posting warning signs.

SEPTEMBER 1977 – The Department of Parks and Recreation is in the process of improving the program provided for senior citizens. One step in this direction will be the official opening of a senior lounge on September 19. It is hoped that the lounge will become a focal point for senior citizens to gather, socialize and have information provided from a central source regarding pensions, friends, trips, nutrition and other matters of interest.

Recycle Motor Oil, Antifreeze, Batteries

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries is Saturday, September 8, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Northside Property Yard, 600 Mill St., N.E. (entrance at the dead end of the street). This service of the Public Works Department provides citizens a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products. Too often, used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water, releasing toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic into the environment. Recycled oil is a valuable resource that can be re-manufactured into new fuels.

Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison.

Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facilities. In Virginia it is illegal to dispose of automobile batteries with refuse.

Dispose of waste products properly and never dump anything down a storm drain!
