East of Center St. & east of Lullaby Ln. to Glyndon St. & W&OD Trail & south of Maple Ave. to southern town limit

SECTION VI

MAY 2–6

South of Kingsley Rd. to Cedar Ln. & southern town limit

SECTION VII

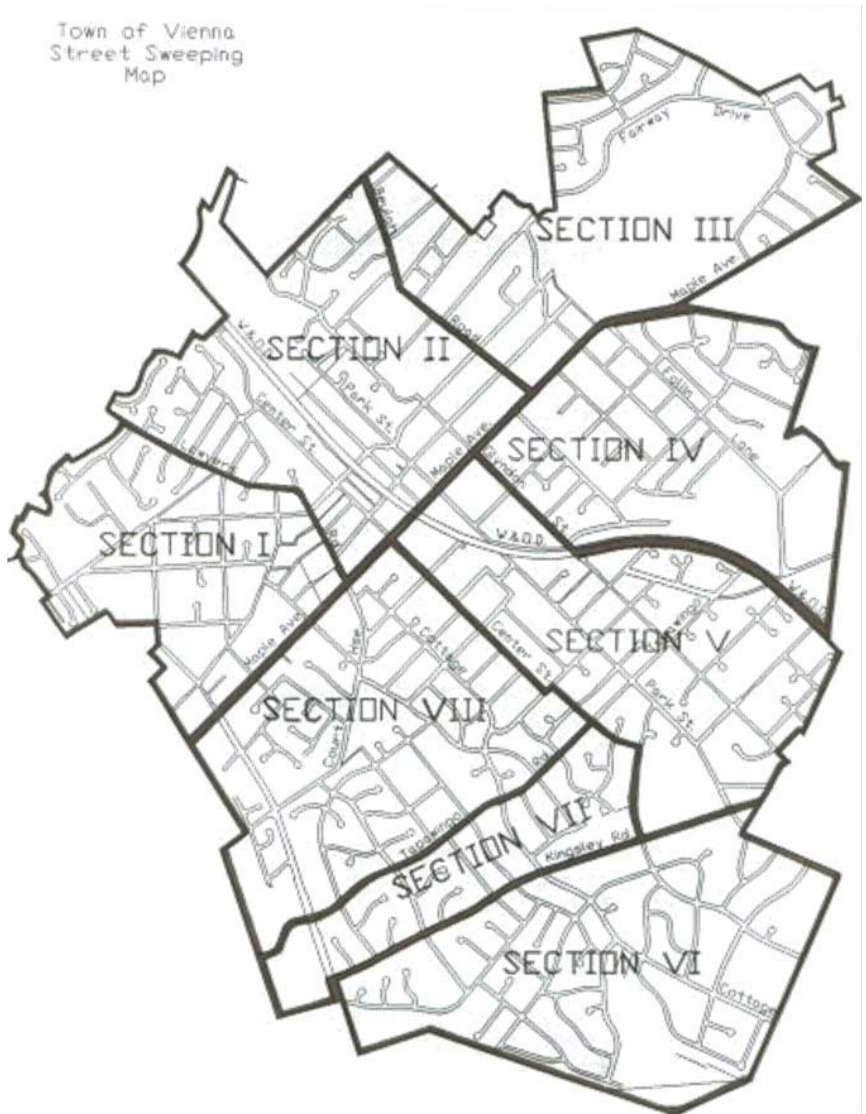
MAY 9–13

North of Kingsley Rd., west of Lullaby Ln., south of Tapawingo Rd. & east of town limit

GARDENING WITH NATIVES

We hear much talk about gardening with natives. What precisely is the logic behind this gardening philosophy? Why grow native plants?

Native plants are essential to the ecological balance developed here over thousands of years, giving survival for all creatures. In Doug Tallamy's book "Bringing Nature Home" he explains to us that native plants provide the right food source for local insects that in turn provide the right food source for local wildlife such as songbirds, box turtles etc.

Traditionally we gardeners have chosen to grow many non-native plant species. We refer to these types of plants as pest free. There is a reason for that as local insect populations have not developed taste buds for these newly introduced plants yet and may not for a very long time.

In addition, using natives requires less "input" such as irrigation, fertilizers and toxic pesticides, which equates to a lower maintenance landscape. Growing plants that require less water is a big bonus with an ever increasing population and the need to reduce our water use in the landscape becomes ever more important. Natives also attract wildlife such as birds and butterflies to our garden providing us with a wonderful nature show!

A few natives I recommend for our area are:

Trees:

- Red, White and Willow Oak (*Quercus* species)
- Red Maple (*Acer rubrum*)
- Blackgum (*Nyssa sylvatica*)
- Serviceberry (*Amelanchier canadensis*)
- American dogwood (*Cornus florida*)
- American redbud (*Cercis canadensis*)

Shrubs:

- Sparkleberry holly (*Ilex verticillata*)
- Beautyberry (*Aronia arbutifolia* "Brilliant")
- Summersweet (*Clethra alnifolia*)
- Virginia sweetspire (*Itea virginica* 'Henry's Garnet')

Perennials:

- Aster 'October Skies'
- Echinacea 'Magnus'
- Helenium autumnale
- Lobelia cardinalis
- Nepeta "Walker's Low"
- Agastache 'firebird'
- Agastache 'Blue Fortune'

PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE BACK INITIATIVE

In conjunction with the United States Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) and state and local law enforcement agencies, the Vienna Police Department will again participate in a one-day initiative to remove potentially dangerous controlled substances from area homes.

On April 30, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., individuals can drop off old, expired, unused or unwanted medications at the Vienna Police Department Headquarters, 215 Center Street, South. All prescription medications, controlled or non-controlled substances, and over the counter drugs may be turned in anonymously.

Participants may dispose of medication in its original container or by removing it and disposing of it directly into the collection box. If an original container is used, the individual should remove any identifying information from the label. Liquid products should remain sealed in their original container to prevent leakage. Intravenous solutions, injectables and syringes will not be accepted due to associated hazards.

SUPERVISOR HUDGINS ELECTED CHAIR OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS FOR WMATA

On January 27, Supervisor Catherine M. Hudgins was elected to chair the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA). The WMATA Board oversees Metrorail, Metrobus, and Metro Access services throughout the Washington Metropolitan Region. Over 343 million individuals and transit services in FY 2010 and growth is expected with the addition of the Silver Line through the Dulles Corridor in 2013. As WMATA Chairman, Supervisor Hudgins will focus on safety, reliability, and customer service.

TYSONS METRORAIL STATION ACCESS STUDY

The Tysons Metrorail Station Access Management Study (TMSAMS) began in January and will continue through the Spring. The study will investigate transportation improvements for the areas surrounding the four new Metrorail stations in Tysons Corner. A consulting group has been hired to conduct public meetings, stakeholder interviews and a public survey. Community participation is strongly encouraged to provide their input for the location of pedestrian, bicycle and transit improvements needed to access the new Metrorail stations.

PROPOSED CHANGES TO NOISE ORDINANCE

Town Council continued a public hearing on proposed changes to the Town’s noise ordinance to Monday, March 7. Citizens are encouraged to comment on the proposed changes to this ordinance by attending the public hearing or e-mailing council@viennava.gov.

CHANGES UNDER CONSIDERATION:

- No commercial deliveries or trash collection before 8 a.m. on Sundays and specific Federal holidays to be identified in the ordinance;
- No building construction activity or use of loud power tools before 9 a.m. on Saturday, Sundays and specific Federal holidays to be identified in the ordinance;
- No contractor work on Sundays and specific Federal holidays to be identified in the ordinance;
- Civil penalty for general noise violations.

THIS MONTH IN HISTORY

From the Vienna Newsletter Archives

March 2001: The Town of Vienna will continue its revitalization of the downtown commercial area this spring with Phase II of the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project. The first phase of this revitalization, between Lawyers Road and Park Street, was completed in 1998. Phase II of the project will include the area from Park Street to Beulah Road.

March 1991: Vienna's government offices and vehicles are blooming with yellow ribbons in honor of U.S. armed forces serving in the Persian Gulf War. The yellow ribbons, symbol of America's desire for the safe return of loved ones from overseas, now fly from the antennas of 86 Town vehicles, and Town Clerk Carol Orndorff gave employees a crash course in making florist-style bows for office doors. Thanks to Charlotte's Florist, which donated 100 yards of yellow ribbon to the effort.

March 1981: The Vienna Jayteens invite all third through sixth graders to a sock hop on March 15 in the Vienna Community Center Game Room. The \$1 admission charge includes soft drinks, popcorn, and a disc jockey to play all the latest records. The dance will be chaperoned by members of the Jayteens as well as their sponsors, the Vienna Jaycee Women. On March 29, the Vienna Jaycees will hold their annual "Campers Classic" 10-km road race, with proceeds going to a special camp for mentally handicapped kids.

March 1971: The Vienna Environmental Council is a new group that has been recently formed in the town. Its aim is to interest people in doing something about environmental pollution. Initiated by a group of young housewives, meetings are held on the fourth Wednesday of the month at the Community Center. Studies are being made on the feasibility of recycling various types of waste products.
