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HOLIDAY CLOSINGS

Town offices will be closed on Friday, December 31, in observance of the New Year. There will be town-wide curbside recycling on Thursday, December 30. There will be no recycling collection on Friday, December 31.

Town offices will be closed on Monday, January 17, for Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. There will be regular trash collection for residents on the Monday route.

LEAF COLLECTION ENDING

The last pass through town by leaf collection crews officially begins December 22, in north Vienna and January 3, on the south side of town. Leaves should be raked to the curbside prior to the scheduled collection start day. Crews may take several days to finish in an area and inclement weather may cause delays. FISCAL YEAR 11-12 DONATION REQUESTS DUE

Friday, February 4, is the deadline for non-profit Vienna organizations to apply for donations of Town funds in Fiscal Year 2011-2012. Applications should be addressed to Town Manager John H. Schoeberlein, Vienna Town Hall, 127 Center St., S., Vienna, VA 22180.

All requests must include the following information:

- Name of the organization and names and addresses of its officers;
- Purpose of the organization and a description of its programs and activities;
- Percentage of members or participants who live in town or who own or are employed by town businesses;
- Organization budget showing all income and expenses for the year in which the donation will be used;
- Amount of funding requested from the Town;
- Purpose for which the donation will be used;
- Synopsis of the fundraising activities being conducted during the current year; and
- Statement signed by the principal officer that membership or participation is open to all residents and business people in town without regard to race, national origin, religion or sex.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY CONVENES JANUARY 12

The 2011 session of the Virginia General Assembly will convene on Wednesday, January 12. There are a number of online resources available at the Virginia General Assembly Web site, <http://legis.state.va.us>, to assist citizens in taking an active role in the legislative process.

The Vienna Town Council has conveyed the following legislative agenda for 2011 to the Town's representatives:

The Governor and General Assembly should:

- Immediately examine state requirements and service expansions to determine those that can be suspended or modified to alleviate some of the financial burden on state and local taxpayers. A specific example of what the state needs to do would be to empower local governments to deal with the problem of stormwater runoff resulting from construction activities. Local governments require the authority to review, inspect and maintain stormwater best management post-construction practices. Further, local governments require the authority to adopt their own fee schedules designed to meet local needs.
- Develop spending and revenue priorities. State tax credits, tax deductions and tax relief policies must receive the same scrutiny as spending programs. To do otherwise means that tax policies are more important than the education and well-being of our children, the safety of our families and other basic government functions.
- After all other actions have been taken, including eliminating unnecessary programs, achieving greater program efficiencies, and

streamlining service delivery, the state has the obligation to look at ways to increase revenues in order to meet its constitutional and statutory obligations to Virginia citizens.

The Governor and General Assembly should not:

- Restrict further local revenue authority or sources.
- Impose new funding requirements or expand existing ones on services delivered by local governments.
- Shift state funding responsibilities onto local governments, including law enforcement and public safety activities.
- Impose state fees, taxes or surcharges on local government services.
- Place additional administrative burdens on local governments.

The Town of Vienna Supports a change to the Payday Loan Act §§6.1-444-6.1-471, to authorize Cities, Counties and Towns to limit the number and location of Payday Loan businesses in their locality.

The Town of Vienna supports a change to the VDOT local road maintenance funding formula from lane mileage to lane volume: or, in the alternative, request changes that provide additional funding to localities that maintain their roads and have roads that exceed the statewide average traffic volumes for such types of roads by more than 20%.

The Town of Vienna requests local zoning authority related to the privatization of the Virginia ABC package stores.

The Town of Vienna requests that it remain in one senatorial and one delegate district.

The Town of Vienna requests an amendment to the Uniform State Building Code whereby building

permits for residential structures in specific zoning districts have a two year time limit for completion and issuance of an occupancy permit for any new structure or addition to an existing structure.

The Town of Vienna opposes any proposed reduction or elimination of the business, professional and occupational license tax authority of localities.

The Town of Vienna requests an amendment to Virginia Code §8.01-407 to restrict attorney issued subpoenas issued to elected or appointed officials (planning commissioners, board of zoning appeals members, etc.) unless authorized by the Court or if subject matter is unrelated to their official duties. The General Assembly currently enjoys legislative privilege pursuant to Article 4, Section 9 of the Virginia Constitution:

Section 9. Immunity of legislators. — *Members of the General Assembly shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the sessions of their respective houses; and for any speech or debate in either house shall not be questioned in any other place. They shall not be subject to arrest under any civil process during the sessions of the General Assembly, or during the fifteen days before the beginning or after the ending of any session.*

Currently, an attorney may subpoena a council member, board of supervisor, etc., five days prior to a trial and there is usually no time to have a Judge quash the subpoena until the trial date.

The Town of Vienna opposes any changes to investment policies of the Local Government Investment Pool that would jeopardize the Pool's rating or compromise the long-term stability of the Pool.

HELP AVAILABLE FOR SNOW REMOVAL

Vienna teens are available to shovel snow and do other odd jobs. The teen and the person needing the work decide on the amount to be paid for the service. Teens can sign up at the Vienna Community Center, and residents can call 703-255-6360 to be matched with a young worker.

The Town requests that sidewalks be cleared of snow and ice for the safety of pedestrians, especially schoolchildren. Although some jurisdictions in our area have adopted ordinances requiring residents to shovel sidewalks, the Town of Vienna has no such requirement, mainly because it would impose a hardship on

elderly and disabled residents.

The Town/Business Liaison Committee (T/BLC) presents snow removal awards to businesses and residents that do an excellent job of removing snow or help others in removing snow. 
Town businesses that hire snowplows to clear their parking lots should make sure that snow is not piled onto adjoining sidewalks or pushed into the street.

PARKING DURING SNOWS

When snowplows are at work, residents are asked not to park on any street posted as a "snow emergency route." On non-snow emergency routes, residents are asked to park only on the side of the street with even-numbered addresses or in their driveway, garage or carport if possible. This parking plan is voluntary but strongly recommended to enable snowplows to maneuver more easily and clear more snow from the roadway. It is best not to clear your private driveway until the snow plow has cleared the street because it is not possible to keep snow from closing up the driveway area.

TIPS ON SHOVELING YOUR DRIVEWAY

The following diagram shows how you can minimize the amount of snow that is left in front of your driveway by passing snowplows. If you must shovel your driveway before snow removal crews come down your street, try to follow this diagram:



The Town of Vienna does not have any obligation nor are we able to clean snow out of driveways. Considering the large number of driveways in the Town, it would be too costly and impractical to use Town personnel and equipment to clean private driveways. The Town will make an exception to this policy for the elderly and the handicapped. Clearing driveways in these cases will be done when all other snow removal operations have been completed and only when the Town has been notified of the need. WILDLIFE IN VIENNA, CAN WE COEXIST?

Every day the Vienna Animal Warden receives calls concerning the wildlife within the town. Vienna has an abundance of wildlife, including squirrels, raccoons, opossums, gray and red foxes, skunks, deer, woodchucks (ground-hogs), beavers, and waterfowl (ducks and geese). These animals have learned to coexist in an urban area even after their habitats are repeatedly invaded and destroyed. Animals that normally would never be seen by residents have grown used to everyday city noises. These animals are no longer afraid and are now seen frequently. This often causes alarm for citizens who do not understand why these animals are here. They live here; this is their home, too. They usually only become a problem when an opportunity arises offering them food and shelter.

Although many citizens call this office delighted that they have encountered some wild animal on their property, others simply want the animal removed because they don't believe it should be here or that it may be a danger to the public. There is some risk associated with these animals; however, with a little care and wildlife education we can all peacefully coexist.

Here are some tips that may help citizens with their wildlife problems:

- Do not feed wildlife. By feeding wildlife, they become dependent on humans and unnaturally tame. This keeps animals in the area that would have normally moved elsewhere due to a lack of food. Animals that lose their fear of humans become

a danger. The animals cannot distinguish between someone who is going to feed them and someone who wants nothing to do with them.

- Do not leave pet food outside. A raccoon does not know that the food you set out is only for your cat. Food left outside draws wildlife in.
- Secure trash inside metal or plastic trash cans. Garbage bags left out are great for raccoons, foxes, opossums, and crows to pick open and scatter all over your yard and street. If an animal does gain entry into your trash can, simply pour some ammonia in your next full can and put the lid on as usual. The next time the animal pops the lid off, he will not enjoy the smell that awaits him and he will remember to stay away. (This will not hurt the animal.)
- Do not install outdoor fish ponds, bird baths, etc. if you do not want animals to frequent them. A raccoon who finds a goldfish pond will simply move in and will not leave until every fish has been caught. A deer that finds your watering hole will return again and again, often trampling your landscaping while visiting.
- Enclose crawl space under houses and small spaces under decks. These are perfect places for wildlife to set up house. If you have wildlife that has already set up home, call the Animal Warden at 703-255-6377 for suggestions on how to safely get them to move on.
- Never try to corner or trap a wild animal. Any animal will bite when cornered, and even a baby squirrel can inflict a painful bite. If you find an injured animal or orphaned babies, call the Animal Warden at 703-255-

6377 for assistance.

- Be alert when driving. Deer are on the move in our area and frequently will cross our roadways with almost no warning at all. If you spot a deer crossing there is a very good chance that there are others close behind. Slow down and be prepared to stop if needed.

These suggestions are offered as alternatives to removing wild animals when they are causing a problem. (For more suggestions on an individual animal, please call the Animal Warden.) Since wild animals cannot be relocated as per Virginia Law, trapping is usually used as a last alternative for problem animals. If they are trapped, the majority of them are euthanized.

Another factor of utmost importance in dealing with wildlife is rabies; however, this does not mean that every raccoon or fox you see out during daylight hours has rabies. Animals that are acting lethargic, unaware of their surroundings, overly friendly, overly aggressive, or drunk should never be approached. Animal Control should be called immediately. Animals that are seen eating, bathing, or sunbathing are doing what is normal and should be left alone. Trapping an animal simply because it walks through someone's yard is not feasible.

In summary, the Town of Vienna does indeed have foxes, deer, and other wildlife, but there is no reason to be alarmed. All citizens must try to understand that these animals live here and will continue to coexist with us if we let them.

BE SEEN WHILE EXERCISING OUTDOORS IN THE DARK

During late fall and winter, most people's work schedules prevent them from walking, running, or bicycling in the middle of the day. Folks that exercise or walk dogs outdoors tend to do so early in the morning before work or in the evening after work; both times when it is dark.

Researchers at Carnegie Mellon University have found that during the month of November there is a 186% jump in the risk for fatal crashes involving pedestrians. This is due in large part to drivers adjusting to light and darkness changes.

To be seen, one should consider wearing reflective clothing. Avoid dark colored clothing; light colors reflect more light. And while light colored clothing is a good start, modern, highly reflective clothing that is designed for maximum nighttime visibility is much better.

Some tips for being seen while outdoors in the dark hours:

- Buy reflective tape that is designed to reflect light back to its source. Apply this tape liberally to your exercise clothing. Drivers from several directions will see the bright strips.
- Wear a reflective safety vest, similar to those worn by highway workers. It can be worn over exercise clothing to allow drivers to see a bright human outline. Additionally, it can be worn with any exercise outfit and does not require modifying your clothing.
- Many clothing companies sell exercise apparel made of highly reflective fabrics. This clothing is often sold as running gear, but can also be used for walking, bicycling or any other exercise. This highly reflective running clothing serves the dual purpose of making you highly visible at night and keeping you warm in winter weather.
- Adding LED safety lights with any of these options will increase your visibility.

WARMING YOUR CAR IN THE WINTER AND IDLING YOUR ENGINE- GOOD OR HARMFUL?

Back in the day when auto engines had carburetors and older formulations of engine oil, it made good sense to allow your auto engine to warm up before taking it out for a spin, especially in cold weather. Today, with fuel injection systems, computerized engine management, harder engine wear surfaces, and better engine lubrication, there is no longer a need to warm up your car engine before driving. In fact, it may be harmful to leave your auto idling because the fuel doesn't burn as completely, especially in colder weather.

You'll also save money. According to a recent report from Texas A&M, idling American cars burn 2.9 billion gallons of gas a year. That doesn't count the damage done to idling engines by incompletely burned fuel. To warm up you car, even in the winter, it takes no more than 30 seconds. The best way to warm the engine is by driving it, albeit at a moderate speed. You'll save money on gasoline (we've all seen the prices rising of late) and emit less pollution, which is harmful to people's health.

When you have to wait for someone or if you only have to run into the store for a quick purchase it is best to turn off the engine rather than leave it running. All of the above reasons apply and folks that leave their cars running in the parking lot risk the possibility of having their car stolen.

Make a short auto warm up and the elimination of idling a New Year's resolution. Good for you, good for the environment!

DOG LICENSE RENEWAL

Town dog licenses must be renewed by January 31 each year. Applications are available at Town Hall, by mail, and online at www.viennava.gov. The fee is \$10 for a fertile dog and \$5 for an infertile dog.
